I was surprised to learn that Maya people still exist today!




The Maya people were experts at reading the stars!

We learnt about the religious beliefs of the Maya people, understanding how they worshipped. We were able to name some of the main gods and know what they represented to the people.





The Maya people believed that each God had a different power over something in their lives.

Forever Facts

The Maya believed in and worshipped a number of different gods. They believed that the gods had a good side and a bad side and that the gods could help or hurt them.

The Maya people believed that the earth, which they called the 'Middleworld', was large and flat and resting on the back of a creature, such as a turtle or crocodile.

The Maya writing system, used to write several different Maya languages, was made up of over 800 symbols called glyphs.

The Maya developed a complex number and counting system that was advanced for their time.

Maize was a very important crop that formed up to 80% of the Maya people's diets.



Subject Specific Vocabulary

civilisation

An organised society with its own culture and way of life, existing in a particular area over a particular period of time.

drought

A long period with very little rain.

ritual

A ceremony, often religious, with set actions performed in a set order.

scribes

People paid to write things down, either as an official record or for someone else unable to write.

codices

Ancient handwritten texts. Maya **codices** could be unfolded like a concertina. One text is called a **codex**.

maize

Another word for sweetcorn or corn on the cob. It can be made into **dough** and baked into tortillas.
