


Water is important to Christians as it symbolises a fresh start.


Water symbolises a new beginning for Christians.










We were introduced to what the 'trinity' means in Christianity. We then reflected on the story of John the Baptist again and identified where the trinity is represented in the story.



We looked at art pieces that illustrate the story of Jesus's baptism and had a go at creating our own making sure that we had represented the father, the son and the holy spirit.





Recognise what a 'Gospel' is and give an example of the kinds of stories it contains.


Skills

Subject Specific Vocabulary

Christianity	The religion followed by Christians.
New Testament	The second part of the Bible, which was written after Jesus was born.
Baptism	Baptism is a ceremony that symbolizes a commitment to living a life as a Christian
Trinity	The Trinity is an idea used to explain that three different persons are called God: God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit (who is sometimes called the Holy Ghost). Trinity states that these three all form the same God.
Gospel	The word gospel means "good news," and gospel songs often praise God or Jesus.

Culture capital: reflect on self-awareness and **their own** beliefs. Moral - learning about our responsibility for others and thinking about concepts of right and wrong.
