Before we start this new learning, what is slavery and why was it necessary?

Black people were punished for no reason.
No rights for black people – free labour


Power and control over black people so they could not gain power.

These were our initial ideas about what slavery was and why it was seen as necessary.

We created board games with 16 questions about the slave trade and Britain's involvement – we needed to produce rules for our game and have them evaluated.

I found it hard to learn of the conditions on the British ships and that 20% of people didn't survive the journey

Black people were a commodity so the triangular trade kept happening, they were treated as goods to get more goods.




Where did the slaves come from and go to?

When Charles II became King of England in 1660 he changed the way black slaves were traded. The Royal African Company was set up in 1672, and it was the only company allowed to trade in enslaved people across the western coast of Africa. "This powerful, royal-led business enslaved more people than any other British company in history." (Olusoga 2020:43)



The trade made European people – including Britons – very wealthy. They took Black Africans to the Americas and European colonies.

How did the slave trade end?



Although William Wilberforce did his part to help end slavery it was not due to his campaign alone, it was also because it was not profitable anymore.
