






Class Cremyll Geography Kenya

We used a map to locate countries with a cold climate and discussed what the main features were. Then we imagined we were on holiday and wrote a postcard home.




I can talk about the key features of a cold climate


"It's difficult to get food and hardly anything grows."

The Equator lies across the middle of the Earth and most places at the Equator are warm – these areas have a hot climate.


Kenya is a country in East Africa and is on the Equator.
