Jesus and Salvation

- Christians, believe that the death of Jesus offers us the opportunity for salvation from original sin.
- In dying he sacrificed himself for our sins.
- When Christians accept Jesus (through the ceremony of baptism) they therefore give themselves the opportunity to be saved from sin.

'Thus it is written, that the Christ should suffer and on the third day rise from the dead, and that repentance and forgiveness of sins should be preached in his name to all nations' (Luke 24: 45-7)

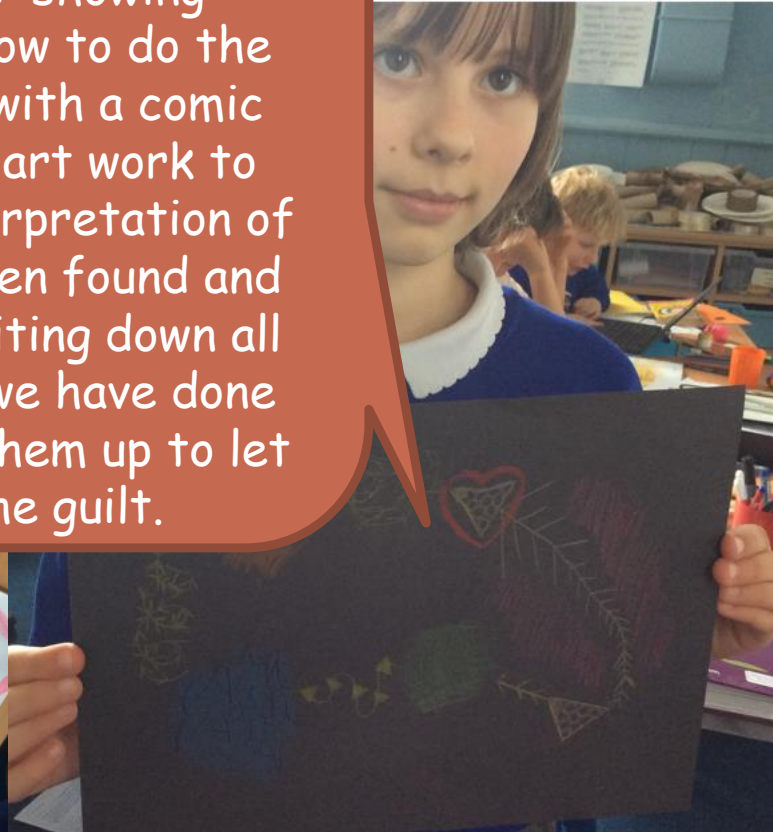
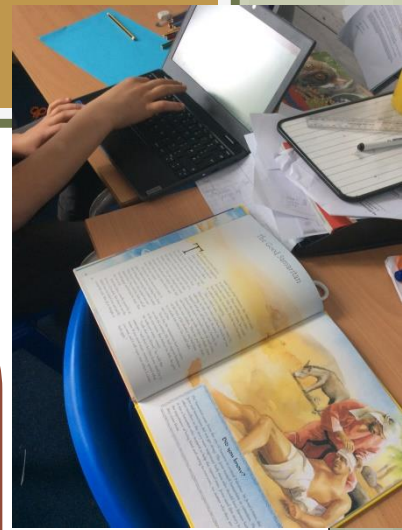
We linked Jesus' sacrifice to Christians belief of the original sin in the Garden of Eden



I understand why Christians believe Jesus died.

Christians believe Jesus died to save them and wipe away their sins

We used different perspectives to understand sacrifice: Acting out a burden; looking at Jesus' teachings showing Christians how to do the right thing with a comic strip; using art work to show our interpretation of being lost then found and finally by writing down all the wrongs we have done and tearing them up to let go of the guilt.



I understand how Holy Communion is linked to Jesus' death as a sacrifice

Children and adults can take part in Holy Communion.

We looked at the different ways Holy Communion is celebrated and what the bread and wine represented.

They believe the bread represents the blood of Jesus and the bread is his body.

Holy Communion Practice and Customs

Different churches have different ways of celebrating Holy Communion.

In the Catholic Church it is the Mass, in the Free Church it is the Holy Communion or Last Supper and in the Church of England it is often referred to as the Eucharist.

There are three main Christian views regarding the bread and the wine during the Holy Communion:

1. The bread and the wine change completely into the actual body and blood of Christ. This change is known as Transubstantiation.
2. Christ's presence appears spiritually, through the bread and wine.
3. The bread and the wine are symbols representing Christ's body and blood, in remembrance of his sacrifice.



In the Catholic Church, the wine becomes the blood of Jesus.






I can show how Christians put their beliefs into practice.

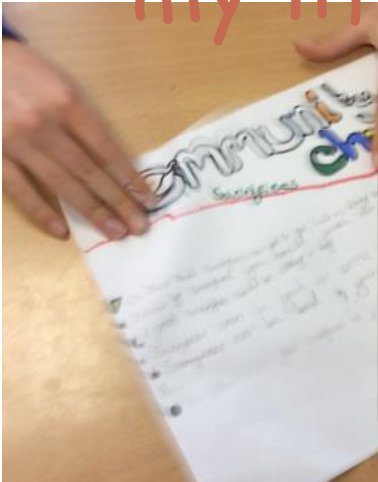
Eucharist is serious and a celebration at the same time.

Yes the Roman Catholics don't just do it to remember Jesus' sacrifice - it is a sacrifice.



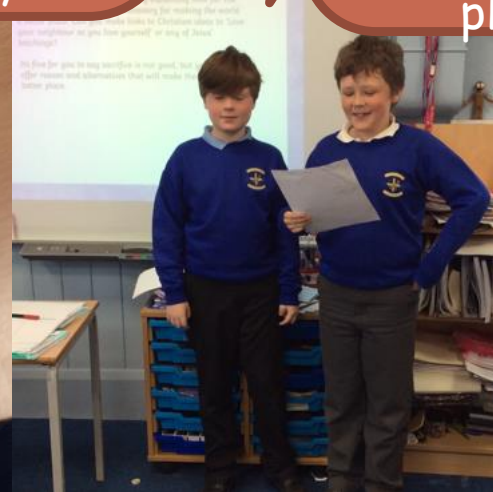
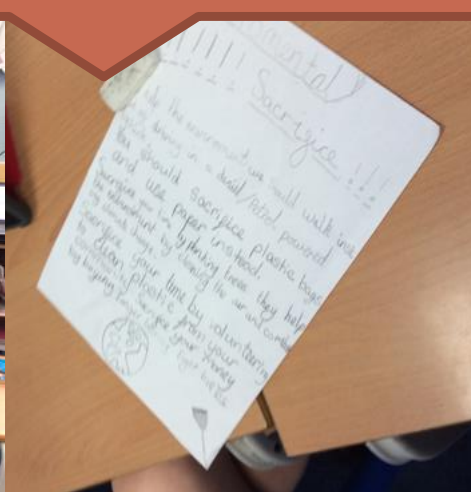
We thought of and created a new way to remember Salvation using acting, dancing, a show and even art work
